922 KAR 2:120. Section 2. Child Care Services.
(10) A child shall not be subjected to:
(a) Corporal physical discipline pursuant to KRS 199.896(18);
(b) Loud, profane, threatening, frightening, humiliating, or abusive language; or
(c) Discipline that is associated with:
1. Rest;
2. Toileting; or
3. Food.

Findings:

General: Based on interview and review of documentation, the director and caregivers placed children, four-years to six-years-old, in a high chair as a form of discipline. These same high chairs were used by children during meal time by younger children.

922 KAR 2:120. Section 11. Toys and Furnishings.

(2) Indoor and outdoor equipment shall:

- (a) Be clean, safe, and in good repair;**
- (b) Meet the physical, developmental needs, and interests of children of different age groups;**
- (c) Be free from sharp points or corners, splinters, protruding nails or bolts, loose or rusty parts, hazardous small parts, lead-based paint, poisonous material, and flaking or chalking paint; and**
- (d) Be designed to guard against entrapment or situations that may cause strangulation.**

Findings:

General: Based on interview and review of documentation, the director and caregivers used high chairs as a form of discipline. Interviews determined children, four-years to six-years-old, who refused to remain in time out and who fell on the floor because he/she was upset, were placed in a high chair until the child calmed down. A child was placed in a high chair for approximately four (4) to five (5) minutes but not longer than ten (10) minutes. Review of manufacturer's documentation determined the high chairs were Rubbermaid Commercial Sturdy Youth Seats and intended for children under three-years of age.
